What is the Liberty's Torch Program?

Presented citywide, this program is sponsored by Glen Cove Salutes, a collaborative project of the City of Glen Cove's Veteran Affairs Office and the Glen Cove Public Library to honor the city's military service men and women. This essay competition gives middle school students an opportunity to write essays expressing their views on an annual patriotic theme.

How Am I Judged?

You will be judged according to the thoroughness of your research, personal reflection of the theme, and clarity of ideas communicated in the essay.

Knowledge of the theme is worth 30 points:

You must show a thorough knowledge of the theme in your work. Demonstrate you have researched the issue extensively.

Theme development is worth 35 points:

Answer all relevant facts about the theme such as the who, what, where, when and why. Relate the theme to your own experiences.

Clarity of ideas is worth 35 points:

Write your essay in an easy-to-understand format. Leave your reader with a clear understanding of your explanation of the theme.

What Are the Rules?

- You must be the sole author of your own essay.
- All essays must be typed and double-spaced. Essays must address the official contest prompt and be written in English. Essays must be between 300 - 400 words in length. The essay title or footnotes do not contribute to the word count.

- In no circumstances should contestants identify themselves within their essay (including, but not limited to, your name, school, city, state, race or national origin.) Do not put your name on the essay. The entry form serves as your essay's cover sheet. Staple the official Student Entry Form on top of your essay. Contestants may submit only one essay entry during each competition.
- Contestants must write an original essay with limited guidance from others. The overall approach to the Liberty's Torch theme should be positive and clearly focused. Poetry is not acceptable. Any quotations or copyrighted material used in the essays must be identified properly. Failure to identify non-original material will result in disqualification.
- All essays become the property of the Glen Cove Public Library and the City of Glen Cove's Veteran Affairs Office, who will have the right to edit, publish or otherwise duplicate any essay entered into the contest without payment to the author. The Glen Cove Public Library and the City of Glen Cove's Veteran Affairs Office retain non-exclusive rights to the use of your essay and likeness in the promotion and execution of both organizations' programs and activities.
